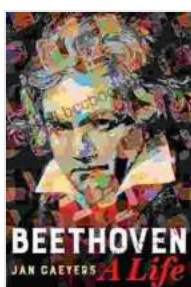


Beethoven: Life of a Genius

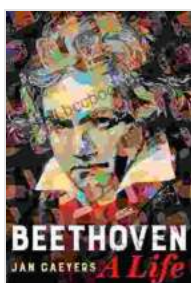
